
Letter from the Township Manager



Dear Neighbor,





POLICE

In July, the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission announced that our Police Department had become an "accredited" agency in Pennsylvania. Our Department is constantly striving to deliver professional police services to our residents and visitors. Essentially, an outside commission examined our policies, procedures, and headquarters to ensure we are providing services in the best way possible. Haverford is only one of 126 agencies in the Commonwealth to achieve the level of Accreditation since the program started in 2001. As we fight the opioid epidemic, the Police Department continues to carry the life-saving drug, Naloxone. So far in 2020, officers delivered the drug fifteen times and helped save thirteen lives. We encourage all residents to take part in the fight against drug abuse and accidental overdoses by discarding any unused medications in the police station lobby bin.

With winter weather approaching, please drive carefully and obey all parking regulations along snow emergency routes during winter storms.

Please remember to lock your car doors before bedtime and report suspicious activity to 911.

SOLSMART BRONZE DESIGNATION

In September, Haverford Township received a SolSmart Bronze designation (with a Special Award for Inspections) for promoting solar development by making the process faster, easier and more affordable.

Led by the International City/County Management Association and The Solar Foundation, SolSmart is a national program recognizing cities, counties, and regional organizations that foster the development of solar markets.

According to ICMA and The Solar Foundation, unnecessary paperwork and other burdensome requirements at the local level increase costs and discourage solar companies from moving to the area. By streamlining these requirements and taking other steps to encourage solar development, these local communities become "open for solar business."

The SolSmart designation recognizes Haverford Township for helping remove obstacles and encourage solar energy development. The program involves consultation with a mentor-expert in the solar field and evaluation in eight categories including:

permitting; planning, zoning & development regulations; inspection; construction codes; solar rights; utility engagement; community engagement and market development and finance.

Haverford joins less than 400 communities in America to earn this designation and shows that Haverford Township is "OPEN FOR SOLAR"!

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN UPDATE AND Q&A

The next step of our planning process is to seek public input on the future development and conservation of the Township. In March 2020, an interactive public workshop was scheduled to allow residents to walk around to various stations, directly communicating with members of the Comprehensive Plan Committee to voice their input on each topic. However, due to COVID-19, this "hands-on" workshop was cancelled. We wanted to share the two most asked questions we've received over the past few months:

Why can't this workshop be held via telecommunications or other online format?

While online options similar to the interactive format of the in-person workshop are available, we feel that these alternatives could exclude members of our community who may not have the technological knowledge or means to participate in this way.

When will the Comprehensive Plan move forward?

While the Comprehensive Plan Steering Committee is very anxious to move forward with this project, our highest priority is to keep our community safe. Alternative options for this workshop have been discussed and will be announced once they are ready for implementation.

We know it's difficult but let's continue to be patient as we weather through the pandemic. A comprehensive plan is so important and will guide development for future generations. We also want to give this plan its due justice and include as many stakeholders as possible.

BEES AT THE GRANGE ESTATE

Beekeeping at the Estate started with the early residents, going back to Penn's 1682 land grant. The bees, which can fly anywhere from 2 to 7 miles from the hives, were raised to help pollinate up to 700 acres of farm land on the Estate.

The remains of the original hives were found in the carriage house and restored in the spring of 1976, with the first honey product extracted in July 1977. The four restored hives are located behind the lower spring house on the northern part of the property, which is now home to a breed of Italian Honeybees. These bees are gentle and produce delicious honey with an even greater yield.

The Estate is extremely grateful for the number of volunteers who have joined the beekeeping group. Our current instructor and main beekeeper is Hazel Delikatny, who took over for Beverly Rorer.

Each July, the public is invited to visit and help in the process of extracting honey from the hives. This is a fun event for adults and children of all ages, as everyone can help with the different steps of the process. This past year, the bees (and their beekeepers) produced over 100 pounds of honey. The honey was sold on weekends from the Grange kitchen and quickly sold out -- so be sure to mark July 2021 on your calendars!

When focused on digging out our own cars or clearing our own walkways, we can forget that snow cannot be shoveled, plowed or discharged into the street, roadway, sidewalk or alley as this just creates dangerous obstacles for cars, school buses and emergency response vehicles.

Fire Hydrants:

Be a positive force in your local neighborhood by adopting a fire hydrant this winter!

Although our fire companies have maps to identify the location of hydrants, winter storms and snow plowing can often bury them making it impossible to find in an emergency. If adopting a hydrant, make sure to dig out a 2 to 3 foot area completely surrounding the hydrant so the hydrant is easily visible to our firefighters.

When it comes to fighting fires every second counts and in the time it would take a fire fighter to dig out a fire hydrant, the fire could double in size. Let's all be part of the solution!

OAKMONT FIRE

How to Prevent Kitchen Fires

You can do a lot to prevent kitchen fires. While you can't remove every possible source of a kitchen fire, you can minimize fire risks by removing hazards and properly maintaining your kitchen.

Follow these prevention tips to keep your kitchen safe:

- Keep appliances serviced, clean, and in good repair.
- Unplug electric appliances when not in use.
- Use caution when lighting the pilot light or burner on a gas stove.
- Don't use metal in the microwave.
- Don't overfill pots or pans with oil or grease.
- Wipe up spills and don't cook on a dirty stove.
- Always roll up long sleeves and tie back long hair when cooking.
- Never leave cooking food unattended.
- Keep dish towels, pot holders, and paper towels away from the stove.

Finally, install a smoke detector close by but not in the kitchen. You don't want the small amount of smoke or steam that cooking



sometimes generates to constantly trigger the alarm but you do want it to sense an actual kitchen fire.

SEWER INFO

Sewer backups and flooding can cause devastating property damage and are not covered by standard homeowners' insurance policies. The majority of these claims are the responsibility of the property owner. Sewage from sanitary sewer lines occasionally back up into houses through drain pipes. These backups not only cause extensive water damage that is difficult and expensive to repair, but also create health hazards.

Haverford Township is not responsible for damages caused by sewers, drains and sump pumps except under limited/special circumstances provided by the PA Municipal Immunity laws.

Township residents must be aware that they should review their homeowner's, flood and sewer backup insurance coverage with their agent/insurance companies in order to properly protect their personal residence—probably the most valuable tangible asset that we all have.

Our Township Code states that all sewer service laterals from the Township's sewer, regardless of location, are the property of the customer and/or owner and shall be maintained by him in good condition and repair.

Haverford Township came together this year to overcome numerous obstacles in a world that can be full of chaos and uncertainty and our Board of Commissioners continues to work towards the ideals of diversity, equity and inclusion. The Board has taken clear steps over the years, including the establishment of the Human Relations Commission and the adoption of a Reasonable Accommodations

Ordnance.

To support that work, we have arranged for licensed showings of the movie "WALKING WHILE BLACK: L.O.V.E. Is The Answer". Our first showing took place back in February and included the Police Chief and members of his Command Staff, along with several influential members of the community. Greetings from the Haverford Township Police Department! We hope you are staying safe through the Covid-19 Pandemic. In trying to keep our officers safe, we recommend calling 911 for emergency and non-emergency calls, which limits human-to-human contact and will help stop the spread. Make sure to advise the dispatcher if there are exposure risks/positive cases at your residence.

We would like to Congratulate Lt. Michael Glenn, who recently retired after 31 years of service with the Police Department. Lt. Glenn will be missed, but we wish him a happy and long retirement!

Congratulations are in order for Sgt. Eugene J. Dolan Jr., who was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant on February 8th 2021. Lt. Dolan is assigned to the Patrol Division/Commander.

With the spring sports season approaching, parking and traffic near our playgrounds and ballfields will increase. Parking within 30 feet of a stop sign and within 15 feet of an intersection are violations of state law. We also see an increase in vehicles blocking driveways and parking on lawns. These violations decrease sight lines and increase the chances of motor vehicle accidents. Parking responsibly is just another way to socially distance your vehicles from stop signs, fire hydrants and no parking zones!

A good way to prevent thefts is to lock your cars before heading to bed. Please report any suspicious conditions to 911.

LIBRARY RENOVATION PROJECT



The library renovation project continues to move forward. The next step is the completion of the initial design specifications and analysis by the Library's independent consultant for design modifications and value engineering. These steps are part of the process to produce a final set of design specifications and put the project out for public bid. All construction contracts will be awarded at future public meetings. As discussed during several past meetings and again during our budget presentation, an upcoming bond issue will provide the necessary funding for this project (along with several other Township projects) but did you know???.....the Township received wonderful news that its application for a Redevelopment Assistance Capital Project grant from the Commonwealth

of PA was approved and will provide \$1,000,000 toward the library project. RACP projects are authorized in the Redevelopment Assistance section of Commonwealth's Capital Budget Itemization Act and must have a regional or multi-jurisdictional impact. Our plans to update the library for the 21st century and beyond with a new layout, new technology and ADA compliance will not only benefit Haverford Township but visitors from all over the County.

CLIMATE ACTION PLAN TO GET AN UPDATE!

Haverford Township was selected to participate in the PA Department of Environmental Protection's LCAP 2020-2021 Program and partnered with Jada Ackley, a Temple University senior majoring in Environmental Studies with a minor in City & Regional Planning. The program provides formalized ICLEI training to the student and a community-wide greenhouse gas inventory & climate action plan to our Township. Part of the process will include community interaction so watch for opportunities to collaborate with Jada on challenges and potential solutions as she updates our current plan to take us further into the 21st century.

2021 BUDGET INFO

The Board of Commissioners approved the 2021 Operating and Capital Budgets at its December 14, 2020 public meeting. Acknowledging that many of our property owners would be impacted by the County Reassessment project, the Board held the line regarding any tax rate increases. The \$47.5M general fund budget provides funding to continue offering our full slate of operations and services including complimentary township-wide shredding and e-waste events. The \$28.4M capital fund budget includes several continuing projects such as the Pennsy Trail development, park equipment replacement and field and lighting improvements at Veterans Field. Additionally, several new projects including a \$1.25M road resurfacing program, a stormwater improvement analysis, and improvements at our historic sites are included in the 2021 budget. On a larger scale, a planned \$20M general obligation bond issue is budgeted to fund various projects including the library renovation, the Brookline School project, a solar power project, and expansion of the Darby Creek Trail, among others. All large scale capital projects will be discussed, finalized and awarded at future public meetings.

HISTORY CORNER

Every day in Haverford Township we can see and touch fragments of the past. Stone and other materials from quarries located within the Township were used for buildings that are still standing today.

Old Haverford Friends Meeting, built just before 1690 and located on Eagle Road, used stone extensively. It was the earliest Quaker house of worship in Haverford Township and the oldest in Delaware County. William Penn, who found Haverford Township in 1681, worshipped here.

The original Administration building, located at 2325 E. Darby Road, was built in 1916 with stone quarried from Allgates Estate (between modern day Darby Road, Coopertown Road and College Avenue).

Other buildings constructed with local stone include the Haverford Township Free library (built in 1926) and the Llanerch School (1905). One of the most productive local quarries was the Llanerch Quarry, located at the intersection of West Chester Pike and Township Line Road. This was rich source of metamorphic rock called gneiss (pronounced "nice"). The quarry was used productively until it was flooded in the 1970s and then later filled in to create the aptly-named Quarry Center shopping area in 2013. The Haverford Township Historical Commission actively encourages the appreciation of the past. It can be seen in the buildings all around us. They remind us to value and protect the rich historical texture of Haverford Township.

Sewer backups and flooding can cause devastating property damage and are not covered by standard homeowners' insurance policies. The majority of these claims are the responsibility of the property owner. Sewage from sanitary sewer lines occasionally back up into houses through drain pipes. These backups not only cause extensive water damage that is difficult and expensive to repair, but also create health hazards.

Haverford Township is not responsible for damages caused by sewers, drains and sump pumps except under limited/special circumstances provided by the PA Municipal Immunity laws.

Township residents must be aware that they should review their homeowner's, flood and sewer backup insurance coverage with their agent/insurance companies in order to properly protect their personal residence—probably the most valuable tangible asset that we all have. Our Township Code states that all sewer service laterals from the Township's sewer, regardless of location, are the property of the customer and/or owner and shall be maintained by him in good condition and repair.

Dear Neighbor,

Many residents have asked about the construction activity at the "Havertown PCP Superfund Site". As further described below, EPA is expanding the groundwater treatment plant in response to high groundwater levels in 2018 and 2019.

As background, EPA and PADEP began investigating reports of wetter than normal conditions in some of the backyards and basements along Rittenhouse Circle back in early 2019. Samples collected by PADEP and EPA identified one or more site contaminants in the soil and/or sump water. Although the contaminants do not pose an immediate health threat, some of the contaminants exceed EPA's cleanup standards and can pose a health risk if people are in frequent contact with them over long periods of time (several decades). According to EPA, high groundwater levels in 2018 and 2019 likely caused the contamination to move into backyards and structures between the YMCA and Rittenhouse Circle.

Based on the investigations, EPA is using its Superfund authority to conduct a short-term response to reduce the potential for exposure to the site contaminants. This action is addressing residential property contamination and expanding the groundwater collection system and treatment plant for the elevated water table conditions. WYNNEWOOD LANES

Properties may be historically significant as an outstanding example of an architectural style, or for associations with a person or event of importance. In 2009, after decades of discussion, the township listed over 140 structures as historic and established the Historical Commission and a preservation ordinance.

Recently, the Township received a grant to research possible additions to the list. Wynnewood Lanes on Haverford Road is one of 12 proposed additions. Engineered and designed in 1962 by Donald E. LeBeau and Frank Durham of Wilmington, the building represents a classic 1960s modern style with an iconic main entrance and raised-box construction.

It is one of the few modern-style buildings in the Township. A separate curved-stairway entrance, designed by Delaware County architect Paul W. Getz, was added in 1979.

Local contractor Robert P. DiMarco built the lanes, and they have been owned by the DiMarco family for 59 years. The current owner, Gloria Smith, DiMarco's niece, maintains the tradition of a family-friendly place where generations of residents have bowled. The Lanes are the only bowling place left in Haverford Township. Their full story will soon appear on the Haverford Township Historical Society website (www.haverfordhistoricalsociety.org), as will stories about other proposed historic designations.

DID YOU KNOW?

For cleaner creeks save fertilizer for the fall

- Fertilizers contain nitrogen and phosphorus which can leach into our streams and ponds.
- Even small levels of these nutrients can overload ponds or streams and result in undesirable weed or algae growth.

STORMWATER MANAGEMENT & YOU

A few tips to minimize the impact of lawn fertilization on our streams:

- -Pa Dept. of Environmental Protection discourages spring application of fertilizer because it creates excessive top growth of grass. DEP recommends instead that homeowners fertilize lawns around Labor Day and use a second application in late October if needed. Fall fertilizing promotes vigorous root growth and prevents fertilizer from leaching into streams and ponds in the spring.
- -Use slow-release and organic alternatives. Select fertilizers with "slow-release" forms of nitrogen which release more slowly into the soil and are less likely to leach. Choose organic rather than chemical-based fertilizers.
- -Limit application amounts to designated levels and recycle grass clippings. Lawns typically require 2.5-3 pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet per year. Recycling grass clippings on your lawn can meet 25% and 50% of nitrogen needs.
- -Avoid stream edges and stormwater conveyances. Do not fertilize stormwater basins or drainage swales leading to basins, or within 25 feet of stormwater basins or streams.

TECH FUNDING

With challenges come opportunities and this was definitely true for the Haverford Township Free Library during Covid-19. With the closing of the Library in March 2020 because of the pandemic, Library



staff pivoted to all-virtual programming to serve their patrons. While there was a learning curve for staff as they learned about doing virtual programs on Facebook Live, Zoom, and YouTube, they also had breakthroughs of great creativity! Storytimes, cooking demonstrations, virtual games, and literary happy hours were just a few of the "outside of the box" programs that reached patrons of all ages. At the height of quarantine, the Reference and Youth Services staff were creating and uploading 20-25 programs per week!

The Library was awarded Pennsylvania Humanities Council Cares grant funds to improve their technology and create high quality programs for their patrons. HTFL is committed to providing patrons with access to Library programs both in and outside of the physical building. The grant allows the Library to purchase equipment including a camera that enables them to livestream to Facebook or YouTube, microphones, a mixing board and other equipment that gives them the ability to edit videos for patron viewing. Future plans include using the new technology for podcasts. Stay tuned!

FIRE AWARENESS

If a fire breaks out in your home, you may have only a few minutes to get out safely. Follow a few of these steps provided by NFPA to help your family in case of an emergency.

ESCAPE PLANNING

- >> MAKE an escape plan. Draw a map of your home showing all the doors and windows. Discuss the plan with everyone in your home.
- >> KNOW at least two ways out of every room, if possible. Make sure all doors and windows leading outside open easily.
- >>PRACTICE, Practice & Practice: Like fire fighters who practice over and over again, this should be the same for your family. Take time to practice what would happen in case of a fire.
 - Practice multiple ways that you can get out of your home.
 - Practice closing doors behind you when you leave.
 - Practice where to meet up each time.

IF THE ALARM SOUNDS...

- >> If the smoke alarm sounds, GET OUT AND STAY OUT.
- >> If you have to escape, GET LOW AND GO under the smoke to your way out.
- >> CALL the fire department from outside your home.

HOMEOWNERS

Sewer backups and flooding can cause devastating property damage and are not covered by standard homeowners' insurance policies. The majority of these claims are the responsibility of the property owner. Sewage from sanitary sewer lines occasionally back up into houses through drain pipes. These backups not only cause extensive water damage that is difficult and expensive to repair, but also create health hazards.



Haverford Township is not responsible for damages caused by sewers, drains and sump pumps except under limited/special circumstances provided by the PA Municipal Immunity laws.

Township residents must be aware that they should review their homeowner's flood and sewer backup insurance coverage with their agent/insurance companies in order to properly protect their personal residence—probably the most valuable tangible asset that we all have. Our Township Code states that all sewer service laterals from the Township's sewer, regardless of location, are the property of the customer and/or owner and shall be maintained by him in good condition and repair.

STAY INFORMED

For non-emergency information, Haverford Township utilizes Constant Contact to communicate with residents (in addition to social media, our website, and our newsletter).

Please join the Haverford Township email lists which can be found at www.havtwp.org/Quick_Links. For emergency or other more urgent matters, the Township utilizes the Delaware County Emergency Notification System, or Delco Alert. This enhanced system incorporates greater technological capabilities and flexibility, allowing users to set up a preferred method of receiving alerts.

The notification will be sent to all devices, from text and voicemail to email, in the order preferred by the user. Subscribers can opt in and out at any time for the types of alerts they want to receive.

All residents, businesses and organizations should register for Delco Alert.





SURREY JOIN FORCES WITH HAVERFORD

Surrey, a provider of programs, services, and home care to older adults from its Senior Center in Havertown is excited to announce a new initiative to benefit the entire Haverford community. Thanks to a generous grant from Haverford Township (thru its CARES funding), this new program, The Surrey Academy, will support and train



those who care for older adults through an innovative educational program for caregiver candidates and family members, that provides the skills and knowledge to effectively help older adults remain well and safe in their homes. In addition to helping family caregivers gain the skills needed to care for a loved one, The Surrey Academy will provide an opportunity for individuals to gain employment and begin a career path in senior

CODES CORNER: PUBLIC SHADE TREES

The Board of Commissioners recently approved changes to the Township tree code. While at any time you can find the full municiple code book at www.havtwp.org/Resources.html, some important things to note as residents of Haverford, is the Public Shade Trees section.

FIRST, WHAT DOES THE TOWNSHIP MEAN BY PUBLIC SHADE TREE?

As stated in the code book, a public shade tree is any tree in or upon any public park, property, street, highway and/or avenue in the Township of Haverford, or that part of any tree which extends within the lines of any public street, highway and/or avenue in the Township of Haverford.

SECOND, THE CODE.

170-3. Regulations and Requirements for Public Shade Trees.

A. Applicability.

(1) The standards of this section shall apply to all Public Shade Trees in Haverford Township, including the portion of a Public Shade Tree on private property.

B. Permit Required.

- (1) No person shall plant, prune, remove or spray a Public Shade Tree in or upon any public street, highway and/or avenue without a written permit from the Township Manager, such permit to designate the type of tree and place where such Public Shade Tree is to be planted, pruned, sprayed and/or removed, except that shall not be unlawful to perform the following activities:
- i. Trim shade trees to conform to the clearance requirements of Section C(4) hereof; trim or prune shrubs and bushes within the public area, remove or cut off low hanging or broken branches of trees which create or may create a public nuisance or danger; carry out normal repair, upkeep, minor pruning and trimming..



SO WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR THE RESIDENTS?

Before you trim, cut, prune, or plant, check out the Code to determine if it applies to your plans. If you have any questions you can reach out to the Codes department through an email to JCelia@ havtwp.org.

AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT

In March 2021, President Biden and the US Congress approved the American Rescue Spending Act of 2021 (ARPA) which provided resources for fiscal recovery due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Included in the Act was funding for state and local governments, including Haverford Township! Our direct allocation was calculated by the US Treasury Department at \$19.8m payable in two payments -- \$9.9m was received in May 2021 and the remaining \$9.9m is due to us by May 2022. Permissible spending programs include those that 1) support the PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY brought on by COVID-19; 2) address NEGATIVE ECONOMIC IMPACTS brought on by COVID-19; 3) provide SERVICES TO COMMUNITIES DISPROPORTIONATELY IMPACTED by COVID-19; 4) provide PREMIUM PAY to essential workers; 5) address WATER, SEWER AND BROADBAND INFRASTRUCTURE; and 6) replace PUBLIC SECTOR REVENUE LOSS. A proposed spending structure for these monies was publically discussed at the July and August Board of Commissioner meetings and actual use of these dollars will be part of the annual budget process. Fund usage must be incurred by December 31, 2024 and actually spent by December 31, 2026. All purchasing under ARPA is subject to the same requirements as any municipal purchase such as bidding, advertising, and public awarding of contracts.

FIRE SAFTEY CORNER

Winter holidays are a time for families and friends to get together. But that also means a greater risk for fire. Following a few simple tips will ensure a happy and fire-safe holiday season.

Holiday Decorating • Be careful with holiday

- Be careful with holiday decorations. Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant.
- Keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn.
- Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Use clips, not nails, to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged.
- Keep decorations away from windows and doors.

Holiday Entertaining

- Test your smoke alarms and tell guests about your home fire escape plan.
- Keep children and pets away from lit candles.
- Keep matches and lighters up high in a locked cabinet.
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stovetop.
- Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers. Wet cigarette butts with water before discarding.



Before Heading Out or to Bed..

Blow out lit candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Turn off all light strings and decorations before leaving home or going to bed





Snow covered fire hydrants can greatly hamper firefighting efforts. Adopt a nearby hydrant during snow storms. Clear a 6 foot space around the hydrant and ensure a clear path to the street. Snow covered hydrants can be very difficult to locate and can increase the chances that the hydrant will be frozen shut. When firefighters need to access a snow covered hydrant they must first expend precious time and energy to shovel out the hydrant. Home and business owners, please help keep the township safe by clearing snow from nearby hydrants.

HISTORY CORNER

f I he former Haverford Township building, located at 2325 Darby Rd is a historical treasure protected by the township's preservation ordinance (HRS#045-HA-111C). The building stands at the very heart of Havertown, both in location and in the important role that it has played in the history of our community. The building was constructed in 1916-1917 to serve as the Haverford Administration & Service Building. Stone for its construction was quarried from the Allgates Estate—home of H. Gates Lloyd, an early chairman of the Board of Commissioners. The architect was John Lackman, of the Philadelphia firm Lackman & Murphy, and a Brookline resident. The building was designed in the Colonial Revival architectural style, a popular trend in the early 20th century which evoked earlier colonial times and was very popular in Haverford Township and throughout the country. The structure has an understated modesty, belying the importance of decisions made within its walls such as establishing the first zoning and building codes and approving new schools, parks, and public services. Next time you are in the area, be sure to take a look at this historical gem!


